Introduction on Status of the workshops

Nina Graveline makes a brief review of the GA status for December, kindly reminder to all attendants to make the hotel registration and form registration in order to organize the workshop.

Hadi Jaafar asks if some stakeholder could attend to the GA, to this Fethi Ben Hamouda adds that Sahal Samir, who is invited to the GA is worker in INAT but at the same time is a stakeholder.

Nina Graveline proposes to discuss collectively if it's needed to invite the stakeholder to this meeting. Nina Also remarks that the limit on maximum attendants are 20 people. Paolo Mazzoli has no objection on inviting any stakeholder, but he doesn't think any stakeholder from Italy will attend. The same with the Spanish and Tunisian Labs. It is agreed that is more interesting that the stakeholders attend the workshop instead the GA. [NB: the official GA is not allowed to external members]. It would be good that those attending the workshop are

those that will implement or participate to the implementation of the participation. The training will be on a participative mode.

Fethi Ben Hamouda will contact Issam Nouri the same day in order to confirm the final list of Tunisian lab's attendants.

The GA agenda will be developed by Nina Graveline, C. Dionisio Perez Blanco, and the rest of the IP in the incoming months, and the same with the Workshop that will be elaborated with the LISODE / participation experts.

Nina Graveline reminds to fill the Talanoa sourcebook metadata excel with information from the different meetings from each water lab. Nina has included an extra column in case an extra workshop is needed to collect more info and solutions.

Paolo Mazzoli will send three links for making the Champions team indicators, upload a brief abstract of the stakeholder workshop minutes, and hope to collect all the information by the end of the October (the ideal situation would be got it once all stakeholder meetings have already done and three months before the stakeholder meeting).

Francesco Sapino presents the updating situation of the microeconomic modelling from the USAL water lab with the rest of the labs.

Francesco Sapino has started to work with the Egyptian lab, but he needs the data from this water lab for calibrating the models. He is already working on the Tunisian case study, and he has finished with the model calibration referring to the Lebanese case study.

Working with CMCC he is coupling the micro-economic and macro-economic models. He doesn't know if this could be useful for the rest of the Talanoa water labs but could be tried to implement the micro-macro coupling. Francesco Sapino also asks Paolo Mazzoli about micro-economic modelling who refers to Jaroslav Mysiak who oversees the micro-economic modelling in order to get a future meeting to organize this.

Nina Graveline mention that they are working on the perennial crops (vine in majority) and making a new crop database as the Aude River Basin is a new study area and as such the economic model is not very advanced. She adds also that she thinks perennial are worth to mention because they are a water use that is unflexible thus important to consider. Francesco Sapino replies saying that actually in the case studies of Spain, Lebanon and Tunisia the perineal crops are not relevant crops, there are vineyard crops but is not so relevant, so is not as important crop as for example it could be in France.

Paolo Mazzoli comments that he is working with the stakeholders to reach an agreement in the solutions and strategies.

Fethi Ben Hamouda talks about his first workshop in Tunisia. A workshop that was attended by 60 people through 2.5 days and from different sectors such as farmers, researchers, River Basin Authorities, and more administration organizations.
